AGEING - not only a biologically defined phase of life, but as social practice also part of a cultural system. Conceptualized like this, age(ing) can be understood as a processual unit whose meaning will only become apparent by analyzing a multitude of actors and their actions. It is such a perspective, clearly belonging to the cultural sciences, that manages to do justice to both the biographical and cultural as well as the biological diversity of age(ing), while at the same time paving the way for a description and analysis of these factors. Put like this, age(ing) constitutes a relational category that evades essentialist definitions and demands an investigation of the different relational forms of age(ing) in their respective contexts. This is what the conference "Age(ing) in Relations" takes as a starting point to focus on patterns, practices, and materialities of age(ing), and in doing so, taking cultural beliefs, everyday actions, and material manifestations into consideration as well. What lies at the heart of this conference, then, is the question of what a cultural anthropological perspective on age(ing) could be. Guided by this question, the contributors explore the various fields and forms of age(ing) in both empirical ethnographical as well as historical and discursive manners of fashion, presenting methodological approaches, theoretical stances, and analytical perspectives on age(ing) in the process. The conference welcomes the discussion of these diverse views on systems, practices, and materialities of age(ing) and encourages the positioning of a cultural anthropological study of age(ing).
